Artistic Education System for Social Inclusion of young Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender adults

A European partnership reviewing art and cultural media to analyse how they can be used to empower young adult LGBT people











## Why a partnership on ACM?

Artistic and cultural media (ACM), which includes cinema, theatre and literature, has always played an important role in the shaping of society's values and norms. In the past - and sometimes even nowadays, artistic and cultural media have suggested stereotypical images of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people. Such images had a detrimental impact on the social acceptance of sexual diversity and, in turn, leads to social exclusion of and suicide among young lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and transgenders (LGBT). Nowadays, many artistic and cultural media are developed that have a much more positive intention. Much of this material still has a limited audience of already empowered LGBT adults or open-minded heterosexuals. A guestions remains how

## **Project Aims**

to demonstrate that artistic education using ACM will facilitate learning and demonstrate how artistic education benefits young LGBT adults socially and culturally;

to promote a dialogue between local government, adult education providers, cultural associations and experts with LGBT associations concerning public policies to tackle homophobia and transphobia using ACM as a vehicle.

we can use such artistic and cultural media to further empower LGBT young adults and to make prejudiced young heterosexuals more open-minded.

## **Project Strategy**

To achieve these objectives, the ARES partnership creates a communicative and innovative educational path (non-formal learning process) that, starting with an analysis of different contents (screenplays, plays and videos) of LGBT artistic and cultural media, will stimulate the development of artistic works with communicative, social and cultural value.



The partnership develops a framework to describe films and other cultural expressions and the way they empower or disempower Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) communities. We attend film festivals and other cultural events and organize sessions where we discuss the films or plays and the way they touch the LGBT communities. Using the framework, we will describe and review the films and plays.

Based on these experiences, the ARES project team will develop several nonformal education pathways which benefit young LGBT adults. These could be laboratories, debates, seminars, workshops or other activities.

## How can I get involved?

Learners from the partnership countries are involved in national networks which continue and deepen the discussion about artistic and cultural media dealing with sexual diversity. Learners in this partnership can be film or theatre makers,



teachers, trainers or coaches working with young adult LGBT. You can join the national ARES network of learners and participate in screenings, visiting theatre plays and reviews and discuss their value for the LGBT community. Some of the learners can be invited to travel to one or two of the partner countries and participate in cultural festivals there, providing a European perspective in the discussions.
